

Every person was treated to a wholesome lunch, friendly conversation, and delightful entertainment by renowned vocalist Natalie Choquette, a friend of the Sisters of Providence.

Everyone learned about the origin of the name of Place Gamelin and the woman whose statue is right there at the Berri-UQUAM station. Blessed Émilie Tavernier Gamelin was also present handing out bread and kind words. She was depicted by three women in period costume as a young woman, a mature lay woman and as a Sister of Providence. We met some wonderful people who regularly use Place Gamelin as an oasis from life's hardships. These sacred encounters were with Blessed Emilie's people; these are the people sent by Providence to be our teachers! We truly learned from them that special day.

The General Leadership Team looks forward to participating in 175th anniversary events in Mother Joseph Province and in Bernarda Morin Province during the time of their regional conferences in September and October, respectively. The 175th Anniversary Committee

will meet at the International Centre October 29-31, 2018 to continue the planning associated with the closing liturgy which will be held March 29, 2019 in our Providence Motherhouse chapel, The committee will also discuss events taking place in the provinces. We are grateful for all who are participating on the 175th Anniversary Committee and for those serving on the committees in the provinces.

THE THREE GREAT WOMEN OF OUR CONGREGATION

Isabel Cid, SP, was born in Argentina and she is fluent in the three official languages of the Congregation. She entered the Sisters of Providence in 1967 and today, she lives in Alberta, Canada. As she is a citizen of the world and a missionary of Providence, she has lived and missioned in several countries.



From the very beginning, three great women of our Congregation of the Sisters of Providence, that is Mother Emilie Gamelin, Mother Bernarda Morin and Mother Joseph of the Sacred Heart, affectionately welcomed God's gifts and discerned very well how these gifts

could be shared with the impoverished of their time. Thus glorifying our Creator giving life abundantly, just as Jesus did.

These three women fully committed, in great confidence surrendered themselves into God's hands, "and all else was given them." With confidence and courage, they beheld the suffering Christ in society, giving them strength and wisdom to love, to comfort, to feed, to dress, to encourage, to heal, to educate, to visit, to give hope, and God made miracles.

Silvia Troncoso Salas, SP was born in Chile and she has 69 years of consecrated life to her credit. She is very dynamic and was missionary in the western United States for twenty-six years. Currently back in her native country, she coordinates the Nuestra Señora de Dolores Community in Santiago.



Surely you will ask "what has been my life during so many years." My life is a miracle from God. My health is good and I have ministered faithfully for the Church and for the Community.

I can say that at my age, I have had a happy life and


Antofagasta. More recently, I spent twenty-six years in the San José Parish in Yakima, Washington (United States). The Presence of Providence became real during these years and I know that our Provident God will long remain in the lives of these people. I believe that our foundresses established these great works of charity because of their great spirit of faith, humility and simplicity. And what about their deep contemplative prayer? Their example has enlightened my entire apostolic life in the Congregation; for we cannot touch hearts if we are not ourselves filled with provident love gained through contemplative prayer.

I will never forget the pain that I felt when a loved one of my family died in Chile while I was far away, ministering in the United States. What gave me strength? The spirit of Mother Bernarda, for she suffered the loss of her loved ones, but she knew how to move forward with great faith and trust. Thank you Mother for your exemplary life.

In this time of the 175th anniversary of the founding of our Congregation, I say thank you Mother Emilia Gamelin, thank you Mother Bernarda, thank you Mother Joseph, you have modeled my life.

EMILIE, MY INSPIRATION

Juedie Elismat, SP, is a temporary vowed Sister of Providence. She was born in Haiti, and she began her novitiate in Montreal in 2015. With a nursing background and a heart of gold, she is always concerned about the well-being of her patients. She is currently ministring in Port-au-Prince.

My life, my choices and my ministry are all evidences of my deep attachment to Emilie Gamelin, as an active woman seeking to respond to the various needs of the most vulnerable. Knowing more about Emilie's life and

letting my heart speak, guided by the Lord is how everything became clear regarding my vocation and the path I was to follow. Here is a short account of my life following in Emilie's footsteps, a token of my admiration for her.

Having pronounced my temporary vows and soon after my arrival in Haiti, I presented my resumé at Saint-François de Sales Catholic hospital. I began the internship on the eve of the Carnival and in my heart was bubbling joy, to finally have the opportunity of serving the sick and the needy, giving them their physical dignity, respecting them as persons. It is this aspect of Mother Gamelin that nourishes me the most and invites me to reach out to patients. This is what has earned me the nicknames of "Miss Big Smile" or "The Nice Miss".

When I return home in the evening, at table, I can't stop talking about how my day was: it was

so new and interesting. My greatest joys were the encounters, either with a man or a woman, washing patients, talking to them and listening to them as they talked about their sufferings; I sympathized, saying what I thought. On many occasions I referred to our Lord, He who knows better than anyone what true suffering is. times I also refer to our Blessed Emilie, to bring comfort or a word of encouragement. My personal motto is "listening more medicating, the mind rather than the body, and formost, dignity". With this inner attitude, I have cared for many sick people; my joy is great when they return home in good shape. I also share the grief of relatives who suffer the loss of a beloved family member. I remember them in my prayers, entrusting them to the infinite mercy of a loving Provident Father. Some of the patients and their relatives question me if I would not be a religious. I am always happy to inform them of my identity as a Sister of Providence. I would like to be Providence for these poor patients. May our Blessed Emilie Gamelin give me the impetus to bear witness to charity for all vulnerable persons.

Emilie Gamelin, Bernarda Morin, and Joseph of the Sacred Heart are women who built our Community, thus building our present. Now, drawing from their example, we too engage in the path of Providence.



Trip to El Salvador

I experienced great joy and gratitude when I learnt I would travel to El Salvador and so I want to share with you something of what this trip meant to me.

I do not deny that I had dreamt about it, but did not think it would happen so soon. I thank God for the 175 years since the founding of our Congregation in Canada, the 165 years since of the founding in Chile and the 23 years since the founding in this beautiful country of El Salvador.

I infinitely thank the sisters of the Provincial Council for giving me this opportunity to travel. I take it as a gift from Providence to return to this beautiful mission of "PAPALOTA", where I could once again see those beautiful places, decorated by God, in this sister country. I was able to see

once again the faces of hundreds of people with whom, for many years, I shared their pains and joys. I have only to say: "The Lord is good." I am so grateful to have made this trip with my sisters María Antonieta Trimpay and Mónica Campillay, since we had shared many good moments together in PAPALOTA.

August 11 was for me, and I believe for them also, a special day. We left the Provincial House at 3:15 heading to the airport; we soon flew to Lima (Peru), and later to El Salvador. This was on Saturday. Upon arrival we were welcomed with

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much affection by Sisters Marita Capili, Kathryn Rutan (Kitsy), Marcia Gática, Margarita Hernández, Vilma Franco, Marilyn and Aracely, the latter is a future Sister of Providence, God willing.

Sunday, August 12th, was the festive day with a super early rise. We went to San Marcos church, about a kilometer from the house. Upon arrival, I realized how crowded the temple was, with more than 600 people. I immediately began greeting people nonstop with expressions of joy, soon turned into cries of joy, tight hugs and kisses. With warm weather, humidity was apparent. How these people are beautiful and joyful! What a joy to greet those who were teens when I left and are now parents of cute children. On Sunday the 12th, we had a beautiful Eucharist prepared in detail in the church that now, after almost 20 years, resembles a Cathedral: beautiful, neat, painted, with curtains, pews, a fabulous choir in which Sister Marcia took part with her guitar, and a nice liturgy team. They have no reason to envy other parishes of the Usulután Department; really, we noticed a big change. Father Angel presented the homily on Providence.

The PAPALOTA now has potable water and power. Families are slowly rising from the level of poverty; they had no desire to overcome their condition and thus remained in this state. Today, there are young people who have gone for studies and are now graduated, thanks to grants

distributed by the Sisters of Providence. Among them some are nurses, union leaders and physicians. All are young and serving their community. How can we not be grateful to God? God loves those who trust in HIM.

August 13-14 were days for sharing with the sisters. Sister Kitsy had fractured her knee and was with a cast and in a wheelchair; on the 14th she returned to the United States, for further treatment, Marilyn left with her. As for me, on the 14th, I went with Sisters Vilma and Margarita to visit other families in another region.

On the 15th, we returned to Santiago, filled with beautiful memories, songs and dances that were presented for us. I thank God and my Providence community, whom I love with all my soul. Thanks to all my sisters and may God bless us with many new vocations.





Montreal

Revived memories during the visit to our former Mother House on Fullum Street in Montreal to mark the 175th anniversary of the Congregation

Among the programmed activities during the year celebrating 175th anniversary of the founding of our Congregation was a visit to our former Motherhouse on Fullum Street, in Montreal. Several sisters have long desired to visit once again the place where they had lived their novitiate years, preparing their journey to becoming a Sister of Providence. Seven groups were formed for these visits and about fifty Sisters of Providence enjoyed the opportunity.

Our sisters were anxious to the see transformations to the building that other sisters had already described. Sister Yolande describes the visit: "What a joy to see from afar the imposing grey stone building still intact. However, I was somewhat disoriented upon entering the front door. Indeed, only the front desk and a sign reminded me that I was entering the building where, on November 17, 1953, I began my novitiate and pronounced my perpetual vows five years later, on November 19, 1958.





Upon entering, the contrast of the stone up against the warmth of the wood of the grand staircase leading to the parlor impressed me. There were more surprises to come. The simplicity and kindness of Mrs. Caroline Perron, our guide, reassured me about what I was about to see throughout the visit. On the 1st floor, the elevator was unrecognizable; it was modern and better adapted for the residents and services offered within the house. As for the attic, it also has been renovated and is more accessible than during my Postulancy years. At times we would escape there and discovered coffins that were stored there. The area reserved for residents is tidy, cozy, intimate and multifunctional. The only thing I could recognize were the beams.

The tour continued down floor by floor, along the long multicolored narrow corridors, lined with room doors, very different, in width, from my time, 65 years ago. A few pictures on the wall reminded me that the sisters' dormitories were on that floor. At every picture, I gave further details about our previous lifestyle, sometimes funny ones, to the novices Daveline Livert, Nathalie Jean-Philippe, and Snyrve Valencia Pierre, and Sister Helene Mamert Nga Amogo who accompanied the novices that day.

Some remnants of the past awoke memories such as the stairs on St. Catherine Street side of the building where, on Saturdays, while doing cleaning chores, we could watch weddings at the

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church from across the street; in the balcony of the chapel, I could picture the Casavant organ where it once stood; the confessional; the rotunda where our "elderly " sisters could live Eucharist; the niche of the statue of Our Mother of Sorrows; the Stations of the Cross; the balconies; the interior courtyard; the St. Vincent Pavilion; the Gamelin Nursing Home; the workshops.


Our guide made us appreciate the warm and functional decors the changes and improvements made to this dwelling for the accommodations and greater comfort of the current residents.

During the visit I was a bit nostalgic but it quickly dissipated with Mrs. Perron's information about the new vocation of the house and the social organizations that share the space. All who gravitate there are engaged on continuing humanitarian works with those most in need as did Mother Emilie Gamelin and the religious who ministered at Providence House. It's an impressive conversion; a new life circulates within the walls that still speak of the past.

Sister Lucille Langlais added a few comments about the magnificent old chapel of the house: "The pews were replaced by pretty little round tables, covered with tablecloths that invite you to share or to play, furnishing the spaces in the balcony. Then we arrived at the most desired place, the one where we prayed, meditated and maybe cried: the chapel. Who would have ever thought that a chapel could be transformed into such an inviting dining room?"

This residence is now called "Habitat Fullum" and is part of the group "Les Habitations la Traversée". It is a home for seniors, continuing, without a doubt, the mission of the Sisters of Providence.

Thanks to the organizing committee for allowing the Sisters of Émilie-Gamelin Province to experience such a visit filled with emotions.



Since the founding in 1843, the promotion of justice, peace and human rights has always been an important part of the Mission of the Sisters of the. Providence. Particularly in the nineteenth century, when Emilie Tavernier Gamelin was a "Lady of Charity", she and her companions advocated, in the name of justice, for the rights and human dignity for people living in poverty, the marginalized, the elderly, the homeless, the orphans, the prisoners and the Irish refugees. From this tradition, the "Sisters of Charity, Servants of the Poor", who later became the Sisters of Providence, have kept the same Charism to this day. Above all, they have kept the flame and passion for justice and peace, for the integrity of Creation and human dignity. We owe profound gratitude to our Mother Foundress for bequeathing this important legacy to us. In general in the Congregation and particularly in the provinces,

the theme of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) is spoken of in documents, Mission-related community life objectives, and in daily actions by local community members ministering with people suffering from poverty, in small practical and feasible projects that are promising for the future. Our commitment for Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation is for us to make of justice and peace a way of being and living in today's world.

The Sisters of Providence have constantly kept in mind, throughout the years, the desire to adjust their lives, their projects and their structures to the practice of justice, peace and human dignity. They found creative ways to helping by donating their time and sharing prayers or a compassionate gesture towards those surrounding them. They did and still do advocate in defense of human rights, fight against human trafficking; assist immigrants,



refugees, homeless, and other punctual solidarities.

In this year that celebrates the 175th anniversary of the founding, we rejoice in the sisters' efforts to achieve justice, peace, and integrity of Creation, the restoration of human dignity, in order to improve children's living conditions, such as in Chile and Haiti, through education, assistance to families and developing countries, by our involvement in the Roncalli International Foundation, and the environment. Another way is the promotion of *Laudato Si'* as a tool for

teaching integral ecology, which combines the well-being of human beings and of all Creation. The same zeal as our predecessors still drives us to promote and bear witness to a more human life, in harmony with the integrity of Creation, because all are responsible for the protection and care of Creation. May we renew our passion for Justice, each of us in her milieu or with other religious congregations to promote even more Justice, Peace and respect for Creation.

Starvin' for Justice!

Sister Joan Campbell joins annual fast and vigil to abolish the death penalty by Jennifer Roseman

From June 29 to July 2, hundreds of death penalty abolitionists from around the country gathered on the steps of the U.S. Supreme Court in Washington, D.C., to call for an end to capital punishment in the United States. This was the 25th year for this gathering for grassroots training, advocacy, action, community and education. Each evening featured stories from murder victims' family members, and from death row exonerees, death row families and leaders in the national abolition movement. One of those attendees was Sister Joan Campbell of Mother Joseph Province, who has been tirelessly crusading against the death penalty for decades.

"From our capitol in Olympia, Washington, to the steps of the Supreme Court in Washington, D.C., I have lobbied, talked and testified against death the penalty! At the 'Starvin' for Justice' event I was privileged to be invited to tell the story of my life against the penalty," death Sister Joan

Standing with refugees and immigrants

Mother Joseph Province local community visits Refugee Women's Alliance day care in Seattle

On June 28, the Esperanza Community of Mother Joseph Province took a small step into the life of refugee and immigrant families by visiting the Refugee Women's Alliance (ReWA) day care program in Seattle. We were greeted by Mahnaz Eshetu, executive director of the agency which was founded by four refugee

women over thirty years ago to help refugee and immigrant families adjust to life in America, or more particularly in Seattle.

Our visit was our commemorating Mother Gamelin's early care for children and for the refugees from Europe who immigrated to Canada during wars and famine in Europe. Our request was to witness the day care program in particular, although ReWA has a vast array of services stimulated by the expressed need of the population served by the agency. These services have changed and increased over time.

Our visit began with an overview of ReWA and an introduction to Susan, the director of the day care program. Susan came to the United States from China as a 7-year-old. She explained that the staff/teachers in the

day care are all immigrants, all certified, and are encouraged to continue their own education with support from ReWA to increase their skills and to obtain advanced credentials in their chosen professions. All of the staff of the ReWA day care program are bilingual.

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The centerpiece of our visit was the children! We were introduced to the 3-year-olds, who were seated on tiny chairs around a low table, intently coloring under the watchful eye of their teacher, who was "delivering" the crayons as "ordered" by each child. One child was clinging "grandma," a woman from Ethiopia. "Grandma" has been dubbed with this title because of her loving, understanding touch with the "babies." seemed to be the "go to" comfort or person for assurance when needed.

The babies in the program were introduced in the arms of their attendants. The 5-year-olds are served in another program located offsite on Beacon Hill.
