The Lord has done great things for me and holy is his name.

Yes I want to thank God for being constantly present in my life, for my community and for our Congregation. Since my formation in the Novitiate, I have been connecting to the information of all the provinces to better embody the good deeds of Providence in my life, in my formation, in my integration as a Sister of Providence, and for a better communion with the different realities of each province. I often look for information about events in the Émilie-Gamelin Province, to which I belong, in order to remain in solidarity, to provide my help and make myself available. I was ready to go where Providence wanted me to be the human face of its loving presence.

Since my arrival in Torbeck, where I carry out my



ministry, I am in awe. I am happy to be here to answer the call of God and to be a caring presence. I respond daily to this call: in addition to my ministerial commitment to Emilie Gamelin School, I contribute to vocation ministry, youth ministry in the diocese and the pastoral ministry for preparation for baptisms in the parish.

Mother Gamelin passed on to us this legacy of compassion, and for me, I also draw on the discipline of Bishop Bourget. At Émilie-Gamelin School, there is a balance between these two aspects that allows me to express my creativity and to witness to the love of our Provident God by my loving presence with the children and the staff. I feel motivated every time I watch the children and see their progress. In the first grade class, where I spend most of my time, I am often amazed because the children are pearls; despite all the problems they experience at home, they have confidence in me. Seeing their enthusiasm, as they engage in handicrafts, motivates me. In this ministry, I can really experience what compassion for the weakest is. I give the children my attention and in every activity, I try to be with each child individually. One of the things that delights me is to witness the joy of the children, for them, this is a time not to be wasted. I am able to recognize behaviors and skills of each one of the children through their activities, even if they are eighty-one in total. Sometimes I feel intoxicated with their cries, especially when they really enjoy an activity, "Sister Francine, look!" Really, working with children, especially outside the classroom, is a grace!

Vocation ministry is really new to me. I chose to be responsible for the *Rendez-vous Providence*. With the help of the sisters, I believe I can further this ministry. I facilitated a meeting for the first time and I was a guest speaker on the topic of "self-knowledge"; both of these experiences were satisfying for me.

I'm happy to be part of the executive team for the youth ministry in the Diocese of Les Cayes. Through this ministry, I am discovering more and more the needs of the youth. My Mission in Alberta



Sister Dolores Blanchette participated in the celebrations of the 175th anniversary of the Congregation and she kindly accepted to share with us about her missionary life in Holy Angels Province: Hello from Calgary

After spending 24 years in McLennan, Alberta, working in the Nursing Home of 70 beds, I received the obedience to move to Calgary.

Here I continue to work in Pastoral Care in a home of 106 beds.

Lacombe Home Care Centre started in 1909 by Father Albert Lacombe, an Oblate Priest.

In those days, Father Lacombe asked the Sisters of Providence of Montreal to take care of this mission and we have been here since.

My ministry is similar to the one that I had before: Mass every day at 11 a.m. and, in the afternoon, I accompany the residents in a variety of activities.

In my free time you can find me at the grotto or at our cemetery taking care of the flowers.

Calgary has beautiful weather, good for gardening, but often the wild life takes a taste of the products before us.

My Intercultural Experience, in Émilie-Gamelin Province

Sharing allows us to appreciate our culture through these differences

When I departed from Seattle, I was very excited and little а nervous considering the five and a half months to arrived T in come. Montreal around 1:00 AM; Sisters Sandrine Aimée Tsélikémé and Maria Nagui, from Residence de Chambly, were waiting for me at



the closet light burned and needed out а replacement. I wrote my request to Google Translate and I showed it to a sister who went for new bulb and а everything was back in order.

After about a week, I began to attend classes every day with Sister

the Montreal Pierre-Elliott-Trudeau International Airport. I was happy to arrive, since I had undergone a nasty cold and I felt a little under the weather.

We took a taxi to the Residence de Chambly and, upon our arrival, they showed me to my room. I said a prayer and started to unpack my suitcase a bit before going to bed. The next day, I was introduced to the sisters of the house, and at that moment I realized how little French I spoke.

During the first two months here, I could ask questions in English to two sisters. Google became essential and helped me in many situations. A concrete example occurred when Germaine Desrochers; later in the month, I enrolled in courses at the *Institut linguistique* for twice a week, two hours per lesson. These courses have been very helpful and I am beginning to understand better the language. Sister Germaine was a great support in my understanding of the religious language, in learning my prayers and in conjugating verbs. She was a good translator and she encouraged me to speak French as often as possible, even for only a few words.

During the first week of November, I began to accompany Sister Yvette Renaud and other sisters to the Mass for the Deaf in Joliette and in

Montreal. I was very well received by the community and, even though I used the American Sign Language, there are still some similarities. I was able to understand them and they were able to understand me a little too. I learned a little French sign language too.

I also helped at the Sainte-Jeanne-d'Arc Church Bazaar. It was nice to work at displaying the clothes and selling all kinds of items. When someone came to me and started speaking quickly in French, I replied: "*Je parle un peu françaisI*" (I speak a little French). So people talked to me in English or I called someone who speaks French. I loved my helping experience at the Bazaar.

Sisters Maria Nagui and Danielle Charron invited me to visit the Providence Saint-Joseph longterm care facility. I appreciated seeing the residents and the wonderful ministry for the elderly being carried out by Sisters Danielle and Murielle Cholette, SP. What a great ministry!

The ministry that I liked the most so far is visiting the women in prison. It is a ministry of compassionate presence and an opportunity to celebrate Mass with them. It's so beautiful to see these women take the time to be with us and to build relationships with each other. This is one of the most difficult times in their lives and I am honored to be present and to do everything I can to help ease their burden. I also pray for every woman who writes an intention after the Mass. I pray the Lord to help them in what they have written and where healing is needed. This experience has been a blessing, a challenge and it has showed me the grace of God while I try to learn another language. I begin to understand and I improve my vocabulary, and I express myself through short sentences. I still have two and a half months to go and I hope that at the end of my stay I can make simple sentences and understand French better. I know this is only the first step in learning French and I will continue to progress.

Another area that has been very rewarding for me is the time I spent with the Sisters of Émilie-Gamelin Province. I see and understand better the similarities and differences between our two provinces. We have so much in common and the differences seem minimal. Sharing allows us to appreciate our culture through these differences, for example, how to celebrate and prepare events, money management and community life. The differences do not relate to our values, as they are the same, but they reflect our understanding and our way of honoring our own culture.

Sister Marita Capili professes final vows as a Sister of Providence

Renton, Wash. – Sister Marita Nolasco Capili made profession of perpetual vows of poverty, chastity and obedience as a Sister of Providence in a liturgy on Sunday, March 24, 2019, in the chapel at Mount St. Joseph, Spokane, Wash.

Sister Marita entered the Sisters of Providence religious community as a novice on September 11, 2011. Her call to religious life came as a surprise to friends and family, but came clearly to her after several years on a corporate career path that left her feeling unfulfilled. by Anita Wilkins, Communication Director

As one of eight children born to a poor family in the Philippines, Sister Marita moved with family members to Guam where she attended high school and college, earning an associate's degree in hotel management.

For 13 years she worked for Hyatt International Hotels as a front-desk agent and then began advancing into higher-level positions at hotels in Chicago, Egypt, Saipan, Los Angeles and Seattle. Through it all – the 10-12 hour days and the world travel – she was restless. She eventually settled in

Seattle as reservation manager then revenue manager for various Hyatt hotels.

Things changed after a trip to Haiti organized through her workplace where Marita spent time in service to children experiencing poverty. Later she recognized that was the beginning of God's call to religious life.

Marita explored her calling through discussions with a pastor and conversations with Sisters of Providence about whom she had learned in a national magazine for people considering religious life. After contacting the religious community, she embarked on a period of discernment that led to her request to become a candidate a year later.

As a candidate, she moved to Spokane and became involved in ministries as a volunteer at Women's Hearth, at Ronald McDonald House and at Mount St. Joseph. She also participated in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) on Sundays. In 2014 Sister Marita began her mission in El Salvador as administrator of the youth Beca scholarship program.

The theme for Sister Marita's perpetual vow ceremony was "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you." (Matthew 6:33) The liturgy, celebrated by Father Stan Malnar, was followed by a reception. The event also coincided with the feast of Oscar Romero, saint and martyr of Central America where she has been on mission in El Salvador; celebration of the 175th anniversary of the congregation of Sisters of Providence; and her mother's birthday.

"I have received so much love, grace, blessings, richness and support from God, the sisters, and the people we serve—how could I say no to the call of discipleship," said Sister Marita. "Taking my perpetual vows is my expression of my full commitment to love and serve God as a Sister of Providence. It is a celebration of gratitude to God

Bernarda Morin Province Colleges work to highlight Providence Spirituality as one of their principal hallmarks

At this time, an important focus on the *Colleges of the Educational Foundations of the Bernarda Morin Province* is to ensure an appropriate balance between spiritual and academic formation and to become known as Catholic schools which live the Providence charism and share in the spirituality of our Congregation.

This goal, although it has always been a strong characteristic of the provinces' schools, is receiving a new impetus after the *Service Coordinating Office for the Providence Foundations in Chile* started working in 2018. On March 14, 2019, this Office held a first-time, fruitful meeting with the principals

of the educational institutions in the Province. In this meeting, attention was given to the need to place emphasis on the Providence Charism as a key dimension in the administration and management of the colleges, incorporating key concepts such as spirituality and ecclesiology, the personal encounter with God, the shared Mission and the involvement of lay collaborators into the management function.

"The educational project of the province focuses on the formation of the whole person. This approach is difficult to achieve because it requires a balancing of the formation of the human and the spiritual dimensions with the academic and curricular





formation," said Augusto Blanco, the facilitator of the meeting, a university professor who holds a master's degree in educational management.

In agreement with the focus expressed above, the *Department of Animation of the Providence Charism and Mission* has been working for the past year on carrying out regional meetings where the educational works of the Province come together in order to unify the work being undertaken and to establish communities that exercise, in a permanent manner, a pastoral approach. In order to achieve this goal, the *Department* can also count on the active collaboration of the Province's *Spirituality Centre*.

As a result of these meetings, the coming year will see the launching of a Pastoral Plan shared by all the educational institutions with common plans and programs for the subject of religion and a Pastoral Team Support Plan intended to



foster formation and self-care.

This work is part of a unified institutional action plan shared by all the province's colleges. This action plan will incorporate key processes in the management of these educational institutions, in light of the *Providence Education Project* which considers the Mission and Charism of our Congregation as its principal foundation. This principal will be the focus for all future development of the Educational Projects in each of the province's colleges.
