Dear Providence Associates

am pleased to greet you warmly. Let me share with you the cry of distress of all the children who are under the burden of forced labor. Each year the International Labor Organization (ILO) makes June 12 the World Day against Child Labor.

The theme for this year is: "The only thing children should put to work is their imagination!" However, hundreds of millions of boys and girls around the world are engaged in works that violate their fundamental rights to freedom, education, health and recreation. Of all these children, more than half are exposed to the worst forms of child labor, such as work in hazardous environments, slavery or other forms of forced labor, illicit activities like drug trafficking, prostitution and armed conflicts.

The concept of "child labor" brings together all labor activities that deprive children of their childhood, their potential and their dignity and which hamper their education, health, and physical and mental development. It refers to work that is hazardous for the health and for the physical, social or mental development of children that interferes with their education by forcing them to leave school prematurely or requiring them to participate in academic and professional activities that are excessively long and too difficult for them. In its most extreme forms, child labor reduces children to slavery, separates them from their families, exposes them to serious diseases, and / or leaves them to fend for themselves on the streets of major cities, often at a very young age.

Article 32 of the UNICEF Convention on Child Rights reiterates children's' right to be protected against economic exploitation and any kind of work that endangers their

health, education or physical, mental or spiritual development. Despite this Convention, 152 million children (64 million girls and 88 million boys) are involved in forced labor throughout the world, accounting for almost one in ten worldwide. They are engaged in hazardous work that directly jeopardizes their health, safety and moral development.

It is clear that most child labor is done within the family. Others are exploited in hazardous conditions like toiling in mines, working with chemicals and pesticides in agriculture, handling dangerous tools or as domestic workers. Others are forced into sexual exploitation for commercial purposes.



215 million children are still forced to work, or 1/7 worldwide

This fundamental reality tells us that there is still much to be done to eliminate child labor. This

means, above all, the need to integrate child labor policies into broader social development policies, and not deal with child labor as an isolated problem. The International Day on Child Labor aims to increase awareness of the cycle of poverty that is created when children have to work, thus being deprived of educational opportunities.

Associates, let us pray that children around the world may be freed from the burden of forced labor, so they may fully realize their right to education, recreation and a healthy development. Let us pray for the eradication of poverty and respect for the human rights of children. Let us pray for the leaders of governments to take immediate and effective measures to eliminate forced labor, to end modern slavery and human trafficking, to prohibit and eliminate the worst forms of child labor including the recruitment and use of child soldiers and to end child labor in all its forms

THE SISTERS OF PROVIDENCE CELEBRATE THEIR 175TH ANNIVERSARY! BLESSED EMILIE TAVERNIER GAMELIN, PRAY FOR US!



On Friday, March 29, at the Motherhouse of the Congregation of the Sisters of Providence, 5655 Salaberry St., Montreal, was held the closing Mass of the celebrations of the 175th anniversary of the foundation by Bishop Ignace Bourget, March 25, 1843.

The canonical establishment of the Congregation by Monsignor Bourget, Bishop of Montreal, was held on March 29, 1844. Seven novices, including Madame Gamelin, pronounced the vows of poverty, chastity, obedience and service of the poor, in the chapel of the Providence Asile. On the following day, Emilie Tavernier Gamelin, who was called Sister Gamelin, was elected superior of the community, a position she occupied until her death on September 23, 1851.

175 years later, at the Thanksgiving Mass, presided by Archbishop Monsignor Christian Lépine, many people came to give thanks for all these years of service to the suffering and the poor.

Among the participants were representatives of social services in Quebec and the borough of Ahuntsic-Cartierville, members of religious communities, priests, deacons, many members of community organizations and of course, many sisters from different provinces of the Congregation worldwide.

There was live broadcast on the Facebook page of the community. The celebration represented the international presence of the Congregation. The entrance procession included Sisters of Providence from the nine countries where the community is active: Canada, the United States, Chile, Argentina, Egypt, Cameroon, Haiti, the Philippines and El Salvador.

Sr. Karin Dufault, Congregational Leader, welcomed the participants with the following words: "Throughout this



have deepened understanding year, we our and appreciation of how Providence has blessed our congregation for 175 years, and has worked through the sisters. For 175 years, we have met the needs of those who are poor and suffering.

As we look to the future, we are grateful. We may quote Henri Lacordaire and say, 'What I know about tomorrow is that Providence will rise before the sun.'"

In his homily, the Archbishop recalled how the mission of the community is still actual and important for our society, "Blessed Mother Emilie Gamelin saw herself with Mary at the foot of the Cross. She saw herself with Our Mother of Sorrows, taking care of Jesus Christ and the poor. This mission was important 175 years ago, is still important today, and will still be important tomorrow."

For Serena Chappell, a prenovice who traveled from Calgary to attend this event, this Thanksgiving Mass was memorable: "It was just wonderful! I believe that this celebration has raised our awareness of the legacy the Congregation has given to our society, and I hope it will continue for another 175 years!"

When asked about how the work initiated by Mother Emilie Gamelin is still relevant today, she explained that "the needs of the poor have not changed: some ways to help them have certainly changed, but the poor still exist in our time and unfortunately will exist forever."

After being reinvigorated and inspired by an inspiring choir (Ensemble Vocal Épiphanie), the participants proceeded to the banquet given by the Sisters of Providence.

Their goal was to meet up with Sr. Josie Ramac already there and then, with the sisters living in the Philippines, visit the two groups of Providence Associates and the probable new members who would be forming a new group in another province of the nation of islands. Accompanied by Srs. Julie Macasieb and Lucy Vasquez, they began their visits by traveling to Dagupan City in the province of Pangasinan.

A new group is going through orientation in the process of forming a new region. This is a group of about 12, some of whom traveled Seattle last to Sr. when year Julie celebrated her Jubilee. After spending the night in Dagupan, the group traveled to Balanga City in the province of Bataan where



they visited the women's prison. While at the prison, the sisters were able to deliver the two boxes of donations, including a new sewing machine, given by the Providence Associates from Holy Angels Province. The group met with the Balanga PAs the next day and then returned to Mystic Rose in Quezon City. The following day PAs from Punta Santa Ana joined the group for dinner and conversation. Later there was an opportunity for first, a jeepney ride and to visit a museum to learn more about the history of the Philippines. The group attended Mass at the mall, which was not a new experience for most of them. Sr. Beth Rayray kept the hospitality flowing as the group ventured in and out of Manila.
