## The spirituality of St. Vincent de Paul

### in the life of Emilie Gamelin

From August 2 to the 26th, 2019, five Sisters of Providence (Josie Lerios, General Assistant, Hortense Demia-Mbaïlaou, General Councilor, Maria Antonieta Trimpay, Provincial Superior of Bernarda Morin Province, Mónica Campillay of



the Chilean Province and Gloria Keylor, of Holy Angels Province in Western Canada, participated in a session organized by the extended Vincentian



Family at the Mother House of the Lazarist Fathers in Paris. The session was a time of grace and rebirth, a time to return to the roots, a renewal of our Vincentian spirituality. We lived again the life of St. Vincent de Paul through outings and pilgrimages. We trod the same places where Monsieur Vincent grew in holiness and formed groups and organizations.

# What do the Sisters of Providence have to do with the Vincentian spirituality?

In many ways, St. Vincent de Paul was present in the life of Emilie Tavernier, foundress of the Sisters of Providence, from the time she was a young child. When she was four years old, Emilie's mother died and she went to live with a paternal aunt who lived on Saint-Vincent Street in the heart of the city of Montreal. Emilie spent her childhood and teen age years there until the age of 18.

Through the "founding events" in the life of Émilie Tavernier-Gamelin, we can see the influence of St. Vincent de Paul. Like Vincent, Emilie became aware of the social situation in which she was living and of its pressing needs and she was moved to action."

Later she lived with her brother, François, in order to be of help to him. Each day, after her work was done, she would visit families who were poor, bringing a basket of provisions with her. She also converted a small room adjoining the kitchen into a dining room for the exclusive use of the poor who frequently knocked at the door. To serve these poor, she would set the "Table of the King."

After the loss of her husband and children, Emilie gave herself body and soul to the cause of responding to distress calls from the poorest of the poor in her hometown of Montreal. Meanwhile, in 1841, Montreal Bishop Ignace Bourget, co-founder with Emilie of our congregation, wished to ensure the continuity of the social welfare work begun by Emilie Gamelin. He invited the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul from France to come to Montreal.

In 1842, after learning that the Daughters of Charity were not able to come, Bishop Bourget decided to found a community with the objective of **serving the poor** according to rules similar to those of the Daughters of Charity of St.

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Vincent de Paul. Moreover, he wished that the new community would carry the name, **Daughters of Charity**. The term **Servants of the Poor** came also from the legacy of St. Vincent de Paul. This expression applied very well to Émilie Gamelin, who showed throughout her life a deep compassion for the poor and for those in need.

At the request of Bishop Bourget, Mrs. Gamelin set out on a journey to the United States to visit the houses of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul in New York and Baltimore, to become familiar with their way of life and to bring back a copy of their Rules, which would form the basis for the new community. Deeply touched by the Rule of Life of St. Vincent de Paul and identifying with his spirituality, Emilie felt a profound desire to become a member of the new religious community. On October 8, 1843, she received the religious habit and on March 30, 1844, was elected the first superior of the Congregation of the Daughters of Charity Servants of the Poor, called and known by the people as the Sisters of Providence.

Vincentian spirituality remains alive and active today thanks to the women and laypersons involved in the various charitable institutions founded to serve the poor (the Sisters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul). The components of the Vincentian spirit stem from a committed and active "propoor" attitude, because for Saint Vincent, "the poor are Jesus Christ", we recognize Jesus in the person of the poor. To always be concerned for the poor means to pay special attention to them, they are our "lords and masters."

It is clear that St. Vincent took risks in order to alleviate misery and to serve the interests of the poor. It is important to serve, to be ready for service, to get involved and to assist all those in need. Saint Vincent asked himself a question: "What should I do to alleviate misery?" We, too, can ask this same question as we face the problems of our world today: "What should we be doing?"

What amazes me is the similarity and complementarity between the Vincentian spirituality and the Providence spirituality. Two centuries after St. Vincent de Paul, Mother Gamelin took Vincentian spirituality into herself. She wished to meet the needs of her time just as Monsieur Vincent had desired in his time. Mother Gamelin considered all types of human misery without exception, as had Monsieur Vincent. To them, what mattered most was to take care of others, of the poor. This was and still is at the heart of the mission. They were not persons only of words but of action. Both experienced the words of Matthew 25 throughout their lives by actions that promoted human dignity. Both had great confidence in Providence. They have left us a beautiful testimony of lives lived out in following the poor and humble Christ. It is our time now to engage as Providence Associates in a concrete type of creative charity in response to the needs and the light of our time.

I invite all Providence Associates to become impregnated with the spirituality of St. Vincent de Paul and also to

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experience, as much as possible, the footsteps of Vincent de Paul with the Extended Vincentian Family in Paris (France) next summer, in August.

Best wishes for a blessed time of hope and renewal in the coming season of Advent.

### JUANITA TAPIA, PA, REFLECTS ON THE INFLUENCE OF MOTHER BERNARDA MORIN IN HER LIFE



The following personal reflection was shared by Ms. Juanita Tapia on the panel called "Mother Bernarda in my Own Life: Sharing Experiences", that was held on August 27, 2019, in the context of the "Mother Bernarda exhibition in our Memories and in our Hearts".

For how many years have I heard the name Bernarda Morin? Forty-eight or fifty years.

Eventually, I learned that she was a religious woman who had arrived in Valparaiso in a small boat, from a distant country called Canada. My daughters, who were studying at the Santa Clara School, involved me in the school activities, celebrations, the feast of St. Bernard, and contests of poems and songs dedicated to this nun. It was always about her arriving in a boat, but we did not know anything more about her life. I was a very young mother

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devoted to everything related to my daughters' education, together with my husband. We tried to do the best we could in our mission as parents. I must admit that I did not speak much, I just listened. My family grew and we remained committed parents.

I am not aware of when my knowledge of Mother Bernarda evolved and I began to add the surname, "Sister of Providence". During a family dinner conversation, my husband remembered that he had met these religious in his beloved native city of Temuco. At the time, he was a mischievous schoolboy and with his classmates went to the convent begging for bread.

My husband and I always worked together whenever it was necessary in the Santa Clara and Santa Rosa Colleges, just like the scouts, always prepared.

I did not realize something was germinating within me; I knew I just wanted to let others know this story. This Congregation was founded in Chile by this Canadian religious who had come to our country when she was not more than 20 years old. She did not know the language and she never returned home. I involved myself in her story with all my heart.

When my oldest daughter told us she wanted to be a Sister of Providence, I figured I would lose her and never see her again, like Mother Bernarda and her family. But on the contrary, Mother Claudia Vargas, SP, who was superior at the time invited me to be a Providence Associate (PA). I got to know more about the Congregation and everything Mother Bernarda did in Chile, all the dedication, the foundations of homes, schools, nursing homes, the care for the wounded in the war, all is really admirable.

In 2005, Sister Nancy Arévalo, SP, invited me to join the "Mother Bernarda" Pro-beatification Laity Committee. This became my constant commitment: talking about her, doing action to let people know about her. Often when we, the members of this committee, felt discouraged, I would tell them, "Mother Bernarda does not want to be declared a saint, because she always was one." But

today, I believe and I am convinced that now is the time for her to be recognized as a saint.

Also today, I realize that I have been steeped in the spirituality that this religious taught to her daughters and that she continues to manifest herself in different ways in them and in the laypeople that make up the Providence Family.

I would like to finish with a thought of Mother Bernarda, which for me is a shield: "Let us not make peace with our own shortcomings, let us not half-heartedly worship God, and let us devote ourselves fully and lovingly".


# TORBECK PROJECT - HAITI 2019 ANNUAL BAZAAR - ÉMILIE-GAMELIN PROVINCE



On November 1-2, 2019, the Providence Associates, Sisters of Providence, employees and collaborators rolled up their sleeves for a new annual bazaar at Salle Providence of the Mother House in Montreal.

The purpose of our bazaar was to raise money for the construction of a bakery in southern Haiti (Torbeck). The bakery will be adjacent to the Émilie Gamelin' School built and administered by





the Sisters of Providence:. Our hope is that the employees and the managers of the bakery will be persons from the Torbeck area, thus generating employment and providing possibilities for local people to learn and practice trades in that specific field. The plan is that the revenue generated by the sales of bakery goods will be reinvested in the bakery while, at the same time, the Providence Associates who presently visit the sick and the poor will

distribute any surplus to the most needy persons. Everyone will be a winner with the opening of the bakery.

The land for the bakery business has already been purchased and fenced in. Fruit trees have been planted, and we even have a drinking water well.

To the \$13,000 already collected over the last 3 years, thanks to several activities, we can now add over \$4500 from the latest bazaar.

This project invites us to remember the **three components of our activities** which we consider essential and which take precedence in our bazaars:

The Mission component:
Together, the Sisters of
Providence, the Providence
Associates, collaborators and
friends, all work for the Mission,
following the example of Emilie
Gamelin, in order to alleviate



the desperate needs of the poor. In this case it is to support the mission of the Providence Associates in Torbeck, Haiti.

The Social component: In our activities, we act as a bridge between the Associates and the Sisters of Providence, and the religious of the sister communities of the Mother House and the employees. Indeed, just like bees, we are all working for a common goal. In addition, our activity provides a special time for our elderly sisters. At the bazaar, they come to socialize, buy, eat in the canteen, see a show, etc., in a context different from their everyday life.

The Environmental component: While taking care of the earth, our common home, as asked by Pope Francis, and out of love for planet earth, our bazaar creates opportunities to reuse and recycle hundreds of items, while raising our customers' awareness regarding the environment and all of this at very affordable prices.

#### **PRISON VISITATION - PHILIPPINES**



This important news about the work of Providence Associates from the Philippines is dated June 2018. To pay tribute to the Associates from this Country we are editing it today, because the Mission continues.

Bataan Providence Associates

Sisters Rosalinda Basilio, Lizzy Tolentino and Angel Malaluan with Sister Lucy Vasquez, Sisters of Providence PA Coordinator paid a visit to the Bataan Provincial Jail Female Dormitory last June 15 from 9 AM to 12 PM as part of their continuing apostolic activity among the more than 190 female adults there in custody.

The visit was their second, according to Sister Lucy in her short talk at the opening of the short program. The sisters wanted to follow up on the income generating project, which they had helped set up inside the prison, by financing raw materials for the making of Seven Sorrows of Mary rosaries by the female inmates in order to help them earn a living. These rosaries are to be picked up from the prison and to be sold to the community by the Providence Associates.

Part of the activity was a film showing featuring the movie "Kasal". It evoked intense emotions to some of the inmates, through group sharing, when they were asked afterwards what lesson/s in life do they think the story evinces? The movie is about a gay father who chose to live his life as gay at the expense of his family and his daughter who married a gay man who chose to stay and be a good family man at the expense of his identity. One inmate who admitted being gay, and in retrospect with her present condition as a prisoner, was reduced to tears with these self-realization: 1. that you can't forgive others unless you forgive yourself and 2. that one's choice requires a sacrifice for another.

The morning ended with food sharing. The sisters brought with them hamburgers and juice and shared them with everyone in the female dormitory.
