editorial on the last days of summer, I realize that time has passed since we blessed our new Congregational Leadership Teamelected and I declared the 2022 General Chapter closed at the end of our beautiful liturgy on August 2nd. What a remarkable three weeks we shared in a spirit of synodality, participation, and communion, whether in person,

through means of technology, or by solidarity through prayer.

Our Chapter theme, "In a surge of HOPE, let new LIFE spring forth" seems providentially inspired as we weaved our way through the General Chapter because we witnessed bursts of HOPE often as we attentively listened to reports, reflected with each other during our tables sharing, prayed, played and discerned together how and where God is calling us. HOPE and new LIFE signs of springing forth in the Chapter decisions related to the Orientations, the Governance resolution, and our newly elected leadership team and in building of enduring relationships throughout the Chapter.

The focus of this Providence Missive highlights the second half of our Chapter theme: "New Life springing forth" after the Chapter.

The General Chapter is intended to bear great fruit and that great fruit comes in the form of new life within and among us. The fruit is not just what happens in the Chapter room or during the weeks that members were together. For the Chapter to be fruitful, all of us have the opportunity to widen our vision of our Congregation. We are all encouraged by that we experienced and are sharing to be more attentive to the signs of our times and the signs of new life that Providence is nurturing, which are springing forth.

As you read the reflections of some

sisters who were present at Chapter as delegates, ex-officio members, or participant observers, we encourage you to identify the sprouts of new life that you are experiencing and share them with your companions on the continued Journey to Oneness. In sharing, we are able to see more than we can by looking through our own lens and we can support the new life springing forth.

We know there are challenges in the support of new life. All we need to do is think about our own mothers in the birthing process as well as in the raising of a newborn through the various stages of growth to adulthood. They loved us and cared for us amid easy and hard times. Think also of the farmer sowing seeds and tending the crops through times of good and bad weather and sparse as well as abundant harvest.

So, too, all the signs of new life continuing to be shared among us require our time and attention for ongoing development and growing strength that will contribute to the reign of God and

manifest our Providence mission and charism in the service of God's people. New life requires nurturing on the part of all of us, especially when not all goes as smoothly as we might like.

I am reminded of Bishop Bourget's words in 1884 when he closed his address to the chapter sisters by saying. "I will not cease to ask God to grant you perseverance in the practice of all religious virtues so that your works of charity become more and more for the glory of God and advantageous to others. I would like in particular that your produces fruits chapter salvation and blessings." With our Providence spirituality, understand by "fruits of salvation" being in friendship and union with God and one another as Christ taught us.

I am confident that our 31st General Chapter will continue to produce fruits of "salvation and of blessings" not only for us individually and communally, as local communities and as a Congregation, but also for God's people whom we are called to

serve with compassion and love, bringing peace and justice to our hurting world. Our Journey to Oneness continues, involving all of us, young and old, healthy and infirm, and everyone in between.

Might our discover new sprouts of life by spending time recapturing Original Love, that Love which drew US to our particular Congregation with its Mission, so needed in our world today. One author suggested that Original Love must be a wellspring of strength for us at this time of uncertainty. Let us reignite the flame of our Original Love for our new times!

I close this editorial, my last one as your Congregational Leader, assuring you that I will not cease to ask God to grant us all what we need to be the Sisters of Providence God intends us to be, committed to the Providence Mission and the charism Blessed Emilie Gamelin left us. I pray that

Alba Letelier, SP

I am Alba Sylvia Letelier Enoch, daughter of Alba Enoch Mora and Jorge Letelier Merino. My brother José Miguel and I were born from my

father's second marriage. I have three older sisters, daughters from my father's first marriage: Marta, Olga and Marcela.

I was born and raised in Puerto San Antonio, Chile. I entered our Congregation in 1985, and in December 1987 I made my first vows. I am now 55 years old and have been a religious for 37 years.

I completed my high school studies in Liceo Santa Teresita of Llolleo, where I met the Sisters of Providence and where my vocation was born.

During my years of temporary vows and while I was doing pastoral work at

Colegio San José, I began my studies in Religious Education and later completed my professional career, which I practiced for just a few years.

Between 1995 and the beginning of 1997, I participated in the Alexandria mission in Egypt. This was my first international, intercultural and intergenerational experience, and in the course of it I had the opportunity to study some Arabic, for which I first had to perfect my French. I then returned to Chile and worked in pastoral ministry in two different schools, and I was also the director of one of them.

Subsequently, in 2001, I was appointed prenovitiate director, and in 2004, novitiate director. In 2007, I spent four months in Edmonton to learn English and I was elected general councillor. I completed two terms on the general council which ended in 2017.

In March of that same year, my father died, and before my return to Chile, in November, my mother suffered a stroke from which she fortunately survived for the next four years, a period during which the Bernarda Morin Province allowed me to live with her to accompany her.

In 2019, I was appointed administrator of the Liceo Santa Teresita of Llolleo and, after the passing of my mother in March 2021, I asked permission to live a one-year experience outside of my country and my province, and in fact, "outside the Sisters of Providence". Thus, I began an intercongregational experience with the

Sisters Servant of St. Joseph, in Urcos, Peru, where I remained until September 2022, before returning returning to Chile in order to prepare my move to Montreal to serve, together with the Congregational Leadership Team, as Congregational Leader.

It was a your source of pride and gratitude to hear the testimonies of people in whose lives you made a difference. It was heartbreaking to hear about your suffering, either emotional or physical fragility or turmoil conditions in the environs where some of you, Sisters, are living and ministering. I am filled with gratitude for the continuing religious life growth and development of all our sisters in initial formation. I am filled with admiration for the generosity and dedication of our formation personnel and leadership teams whose wisdom, collaboration, and support enabled us to arrive where we are now in our Journey to Oneness. I believe that our congregation's decades of commitment and fidelity in the engagement to faith sharing, contemplative listening, dialogue, and discernment brought us closer together as we are in Mission. In addition, we are blessed with the depth and compassion of our Providence Associates and with the availability, values, and skills that our colleagues and collaborators bring to their work and ministries. It is a treasure to have been able to serve in congregational leadership and live local community life these years, with each Congregational members team simplicity, humility, charity, and rootedness in Providence flow as each one does her best in fulfilling her responsibilities. Oh what a joy to remember the nurturing teamwork, of how we supportively lived together, had fun, and faced the challenges together as intercultural, intergenerational, international, and interdependent team!

Since my entrance to the Sisters of Providence, most of my ministerial involvement was within community services. I have also been in pastoral ministry in the parish setting or in a neighborhood community. With the invitations Sisters or religious congregations, I collaboratively assisted in their ministerial activities. Before serving as General Councilor in 2012, I was responsible to oversee the national office of the Episcopal Commission on Relations Between Bishops and Religious. It has been life-giving for me to have ministered to both religious men and women and the bishops. Advocacy for the concerns of religious especially on immigration matters was likened to the Way of the Cross with the Resurrection as the apex. The blessing of these varied ministries was to bring me into direct contact with persons of various needs and the melting of my heart by the transforming power of being an instrument of Providence. I witnessed people's goodness and their deep faith. Lots of

possibilities ... each one has something to give and to receive.

Thank you to each and every one of you Sisters for your trust, prayers, loving and collaborative support that you have extended to our team and each of us individually for the past ten years of our congregational leadership ministry. Growing up in a large family in Calgary, Alberta I was introduced to religious Sisters as my teachers in elementary and high school. I didn't know the Sisters of Providence other than through the Providence

Creche and Lacombe Home. The Creche was a home for children with disabilities, and my hope at the time was to teach children in a similar setting. Immediately following Grade XII, I entered the Sisters of Providence in Midnapore (now part of Calgary) in 1964; I left the community as a novice in 1966. This brief time with the community introduced

me to prayer and Providence spirituality and Our Mother of Sorrows.

After I left in 1966, I worked in the technical library of an oil company in Calgary and Dawson Creek, BC, before going to the University of Alberta for a bachelor's degree in English and Social Sciences. graduation, I worked at the Boreal Institute for Northern Studies on an interdisciplinary bibliography of the Yukon Territory. God's call is both patient and persistent and I accepted His invitation again, entering the community as a candidate in 1975. First profession followed in 1978. Ministry opportunities have always included an element of clerical or administrative work on a committee offering clerical or secretarial help.

The community has been very good to me, allowing me to study at St. Paul's University, Ottawa, to prepare me for the ministry of hospital chaplaincy, which I love. This ministry has taken me to an auxiliary hospital in Calgary, St. Paul's Hospital, Vancouver, BC, and to Youville Home in St. Albert, Alberta.

Community service has been a large part of my ministry, first elected to Holy Angels Provincial Council in 1994. I served as provincial councillor-secretary for eight years. In 2007 I returned to leadership again as a provincial councillor-secretary and provincial councillor-treasurer, and at one point holding both offices at the same time. In 2017 I was elected as provincial leader. Transitions are part of life and I look forward to new ministry opportunities as a councillor on the congregational leadership team.

Hilaria Suzette Bautista, SP

I was born in the Philippines, raised by loving parents in a big Catholic family of 11 children, educated in Catholic schools and responded

to the call to religious life. Prior to my transfer to our community, I ministered at schools serving in various roles: school counselor, educator and administrator.

After completing Religious Sciences studies in Rome, Italy and a Religious Formation program in Manila, Philippines, I was called to serve in formation, particularly in vocation ministry and then in the Novitiate. My experiences in formation honed my gifts in spiritual direction and discernment. In between formation work, I organized and facilitated retreats and

conducted seminars for religious congregations and groups of people along the areas of my expertise.

I trace my multicultural and intercultural experiences way back when I lived in an international community in Rome; then to Paris, France to study French and years later, in Dublin, Ireland to do a yearlong course in Spirituality with a multicultural group of nuns, lay people and priests. Likewise, having ministered in different parts of the USA, I encountered people of different cultures which has further enriched my intercultural growth.

When I joined our community, God called me towards a new direction in ministry. For the past 13 years, I worked fulltime in several Providence hospitals in Oregon, Washington, and now in Southern California where I am currently managing the Spiritual Care Department at St. Jude Medical Center, Fullerton, California. God's call for me to service continues as I now transition to a new ministry among our sisters.

I was born in Cameroon on October 25. 1978. I entered the prenoviciate of the Sisters of Providence on September 23, 2003, and the novitiate on September 15.

2004. I made my first profession on August 26, 2006, and my vows on December 30, 2012.

My experiences as a Sister of Providence and especially as Noviciate Director have helped me to become more open to myself, to the other and to Any Other. I have learned to adapt to different situations, personalities, challenges and to the fast evolution of the world. I live my daily life in an attitude of abandonment by accepting the path of uncertainty, which opens me to gratitude Hope, to and contemplation of God's action in my life, in the Congregation, in the Church and in the world today. In recent years, I have developed an expertise in teamwork, in formation and mission lived with energy and in revitalization of the SP charism.

Since June 2022, I am the superior of the Port -au-Prince local community, and since 2021,

I am in charge of a project for street children in a poor neighborhood. From 2017 to 2022, I was Novitiate Director and a member of the formation team of Émilie-Gamelin Province. From 2012 to 2015, I was in charge of the Vocation Ministry in Cameroon. In 2011, I participated in a cross-cultural experience initiated by Holy Angels Province in Edmonton, Canada.

As far as my education is concerned, I obtained an undergraduate certificate in 1999, and from 2000 to 2003, I took an introductory course of science (mathematics, biology, physics and chemistry). In 2014, I completed a certificate in Teaching Skills for preschool and primary classes in Yaoundé, Cameroon. In 2014 and 2015, I was a teacher at Sacred Heart Bilingual Preschool in Mokolo, Yaoundé. From 2015 to 2017, I followed a specialized training in Ignatian Spiritual Accompaniment in Quebec City, Canada.

I have been deeply involved in the Congregation, serving as a member of the Prechapter Committee for the 2022 General Chapter, and from 2017 to 2022 as a member of the Board of Directors of Fonds Providence. I was also a delegate to the 2022 and 2017 General Chapters, as well as a delegate to the 2021, 2017, 2014 and 2011, Provincial Chapters of my province.

There are many elements of the 31st General Chapter that stayed in heart including the multicultural music that made all the liturgies alive

and manifested for us in concrete ways how international our Congregation is. Most importantly though, there are three elements that truly exemplified for me what religious life is in the context of the Sisters of Providence: the current general leadership team's local community, the ceremonial welcoming of the new congregational leadership team, and the relationships built during the three weeks that has passed.

During the presentation of the current

general leadership team of what the last five years had been for them, it was evident how solid they are as a local community. While exhibiting the intergenerational, international, intercultural, and interdependent characteristics of the Congregation, they modeled for us how it is possible to enflesh the realities of the 4ls. While I am grateful for all the work they have done in opening for us the beginning of new governance model, what impressed me more is the relationships they shared and how they can work, pray, and play together.

The ceremonial washing of the feet a welcoming ritual for the new congregational leadership team was a meaningful of way expressing how exercised leadership servant leadership. As well, I was pleasantly surprised at how open and enthusiastic the Sisters are in meeting us (the younger ones in formation) and how they value our contribution to the discernment process.

Moving forward, I want to strengthen the relationships we built by staying in touch with each other despite of our distances. I also feel that sharing this happiness with others through vocation promotion is one way of keeping the SP spirit alive.



At the close of the General Chapter, I am grateful and filled with the desire to work personally and communally for a transformation that will bring to life the spiritual gifts we have

received from our foundresses.

I would like to focus on the springs of new life that I experienced during my participation in the 2022 General Chapter regarding the new model of governance. Such an experience has continued to resonate in me, to motivate and impel me to assume the commitment to be part of this growing process that keeps alive the hope and profound trust in the Providence of God, who shows us the way.

The first burst of new life was the certainty of being in a sacred space, enriched by the

Regarding the governance model, it is my deep conviction that we are building a future OUr common values as women transformed and rooted in Providence for our times, [which is already] part of the history of our Journey toward unity. We look forward to a lasting future as Sisters of Providence, with a commitment to support sustainability of community life, Mission and ministry of the Sisters in the midst of changing realities, faithful to our charism and Mission.

After our General Chapter

"To abandon the past to the mercy of God; the present to his love; the future to his Providence: it is to assure for your soul an unalterable peace."

Servant of God Bernarda Morin.¹

Taking the words of our dear Servant of God Bernarda Morin, I would like to begin this small reflection considering the deep and meaningful experience of our recent General Chapter, after some years of advancing in the intention of becoming a single canonical entity.

Undoubtedly, it is not easy to think that all our provincial reality will live and is already living a radical change, to abandon the past to the mercy of God invites us to put all our being and doing in total abandonment to the will of God with the certainty that from his heart will emerge the new life we are dreaming of: to live a personal and community transformation from the deepest part of our being.

Walking, day by day, towards personal and communitarian transformation will

lead us to experience the pain of Mary Our Mother of Sorrows' pierced swords, but also the illusion and hope full of new sap from this own experience with which she herself lived. Only by trusting deeply in God's providence and in his will for us will we be able to ensure an unchanging peace that will allow us to open ourselves to new possibilities of community life and presence in the mission. We had already begun, in a significant way, to transform our presence in the works and to advance in their study and reflection in the last four years and now, upon accepting our Chapter reality with the new orientations, we have taken up again this study and reflection of works with the certainty that it will be the Holy Spirit who will guide us and give us the wisdom to focus on them in a different way. In the Province, there are 11 educational works with about ten thousand students served, two kindergartens that take in approximately four hundred boys and girls, three homes for the elderly with care for more than 120 elderly adults in great vulnerability, and a work of presence in the parish and chapels of two cities. How will we do it so that the Providence charism remains alive and latent in these works? It is not our intention to hurt the local and Universal Church by abandoning our

charism right away, on the contrary, our heart burns with love and longs to share the charism of Emilie everywhere, but if the sisters will no longer be present in some of these works, we ardently desire that the charism remains and continues to contribute to the Chilean society and to the Universal Church in the attention and accompaniment to the poorest people, whom our Constitutions and Rules speak to us about. The emerging needs that are different from the specific mission of the present works occur within and outside these same works, so we need to look together, united to each other, the new forms of providential presence in the shared mission, as well as the new realities of our local communities. We have already innovated with some local communities that differ from the traditional ones where our sisters do not live under the same roof, but they do share the faith and hold community meetings both virtually and in person, contributing at the same time to the different missions where they are located. This new experience will allow us to glimpse new ideas that encourage the formation of local communities based on faith and commitment to the mission since the strength and vitality of our Congregation² is found in them.

Whether little or much is done does not matter... in time the seed will sprout³,

Mother Bernarda told us and we firmly believe that with calm, patience and wisdom we will take small steps that will allow us to implement this new model of governance where we are all part of this great transformation that leads us to love without measure as Jesus himself loved. As Sisters of Providence we do not conceive of abandoning the work, hence fore our reflection on how to do it so that Emilie, Bernarda and Joseph continue to illuminate the place of the mission. We know that they, as the first women to leave the place of well -being they had in their families, and then in the mission of origin, will also inspire us to leave certain places to make new life sprout in others, knowing that we have completed a cycle and that we must begin a new one for the good of the mission and of each one of us. May new life, new sap, water our communities and allow the emergence of different sprouts as signs of hope and of the Kingdom of God.

Again taking up the thoughts of Bernarda Morin, we can say that:

"With holy simplicity let us put the means on our part and in due time God Our Lord will give the fruit."4

Undoubtedly, it will be the Lord who will open hearts and ease the paths to live our best and deepest transformation in this new and different process of governance to which He is inviting us, and it will be He Himself who will provide the fruits of this congregational transforming generosity to which He is calling us; only in this way and with our deep conviction that it is God who moves us can we abandon the present to His love and the future to His providence.


It was a beautiful opportunity for fraternal

Sisters in Yakima Cherish Close Ties with La Casa Hogar

Each room sports brightly colored walls. Monarch butterfly art - a symbol growing and learning scattered throughout the home. The new pre-school building has

play areas designed to nurture a child's imagination.

This is the home of La Casa Hogar, a bustling presence in the farming community of Yakima, Wash., whose mission is to connect and educate Latina

families and transform lives in the Yakima Valley.

Its roots date 1986 back to when 35 faith communities in the Yakima Interfaith Coalition (YIC) began serving

people in their neighborhood. YIC was incorporated as a non-profit organization two years later, and in 2012 was officially renamed La Casa Hogar.

Throughout its thirty years of service, the Sisters of Providence have been volunteering and helping the ministry.



Since La Casa Hogar sits next door to the Sisters' own house near downtown Yakima there are strong ties between the Sisters and the non-profit organization.

So strong, in fact, that in 1996 the Sisters donated the house where La Casa Hogar now hosts most of its programming. The Sisters even scrubbed and cleaned the house to help create the welcoming, happy atmosphere it now has.

The 20 employees, many of whom are former clients, are supported by community volunteers and focus on adult education, preschool and citizenship education/legal services.

Adult classes include multiple levels of English as a Second Language and GED preparation. They also have women support groups, drivers and computer classes.

The preschoolers attend three days a week, while their mothers take part in other programs. Last year, more than 200 students attended one of the education classes including online classes.

Magaly Solís, the executive director and the first Latina to head the agency in its history, proudly points out that, since its founding, more than 1,400 people have become citizens after participating in the civic education activities offered by La Casa Hogar. Solis and the organization are accredited by the Department of Justice to practice naturalization law.

La Casa Hogar continued to serve the local Latino community throughout the pandemic including hosting vaccination clinics and providing masks and other supplies.

The Office for the Cause of Beatification of Mother Bernarda Morin held Zone Gatherings in Chile

During the month of August, the Office for the Cause of Beatification of Mother Bernarda Morin held two gatherings: one in the Northern Zone and one in the Central Zone of Chile, to promote the Servant of God as an exemplary figure of Providence. The collaboration of Yerko Quitral, curator and researcher in matters related to Patrimony, made it possible to exhibit part of the patrimony of the Province, mainly historical artifacts, bibliographic material manuscripts related Mother and to Bernarda.

The days were prepared jointly by the staff of the Office for the Cause, coordinated by Sister Ana Teresa Araya, and the Office liaisons present in each work of the Province.

The meeting in the Northern Zone was held on August 13 at the Providence College in La Serena and the one in the Central Zone took place on August 20 at the Provincial House. A third gathering had been planned for the Southern part of the country, at the Providence College in Concepción, but unfortunately it had to be postponed.

The participants were Sisters from the communities who are engaged in the work: personnel of the schools and kindergartens and of the homes of the Providence



foundations, as well as Providence Associates, Friends and various quests.

The two-day program included time for prayer, video exhibits, protocol greetings, panels, group sharing, plenary sessions, and guided tours of the heritage exhibit, as well as artistic presentations prepared by the works of each region.

The motto for these meetings was "Together with Mother Bernarda, in a Surge of Hope, we Bring Forth New Life". Loreto Fernández, Secretary of the Office for the Cause of

Beatification of Mother Bernarda Morin, explained that they wanted to "expressly match the grateful memory with the current worldwide reality of the Congregation, open to hope and life", with a motto like that of the recent General Chapter; which helps to strengthen the identity of the Congregation. The promotion of the gathering, the interaction between people from different backgrounds and the celebration of life through creativity and experiences of the different works, also helped to give context to the specific objectives of these activities.

On August 15, Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary and also day when Consecrated Life is celebrated in Chile, Sister María Fernanda Apablaza renewed her temporary vows in the Providence House Chapel of Temuco, known as "Casa de la Promesa" (House of the Promise). Indeed, the house owes its existence to a favor granted by the Sacred Heart of Jesus to Mother Bernarda Morin, who had promised that if her request was granted, she would create a foundation in the Araucania region, whose special purpose would be to spread and strengthen devotion to the Sacred Heart, and that the house would be called Providence of the Heart of Jesus. Eventually this led to the foundation of a

boarding school for indigenous girls from Temuco and surrounding areas.

"For me, it meant a lot to renew my vows in the Temuco community, since it is the place where I am missioning and because the Providence House of the Sacred Heart also has a special dimension for us, Sisters of Providence," commented Sister María Fernanda.

The renewal took place during a Eucharist presided over by Father Héctor Campos, O.F.M., Sr. Maria Fernanda's spiritual director, whom she had not met for some time due to the pandemic and related difficulties. Among the attendees of the ceremony were Sister Liliana Contador, Sister Ana María Montenegro and Sister Gloria García, the provincial superior, who traveled to Temuco to receive personally the vows of Sister María Fernanda on behalf of the general superior.

I am most grateful that the Provincial Council has allowed me to renew my vows for another year," said the temporary

professed sister, "and to continue serving in this community of Temuco. Renewing my vows means that I feel that God himself continues to act in me through the faithfulness He grants me freely every day so that I may continue on the path that He has invited me to follow. Independently of this renewal of vows, every day I say YES to him. And I thank each one of the sisters for and affection. their closeness and especially for their prayers that I constantly feel on the path of my life."

Sister Liliana Contador, superior of the Temuco community, thanked Sister Gloria for her presence and indicated that it was affection pleasant sign of companionship in joy, as by her presence she represented all the sisters of the Province. It was a moment of joyful closeness between the sisters of the community and their guests. "With this renewal of vows, God is showing us roads of hope within the Congregation, and these call us to pursue our dream," concluded Sister Maria Fernanda.

Inauguration of the second monument to Ludivine Lachance

Ludivine Lachance, deafmute-blind, was born on January 31, 1896, in Saint-Gédéon de Beauce, Quebec, and baptized in Saint Martin on February 1, 1896. She became deafmute blind when she was around two or three years old. Her parents agreed to send her to the Institute for Deaf and Mute Girls, a work of the Sisters of Providence. for her education when she was 15 years old, although most other young deafmutes entered at the age of 6 or 7.

With patience and a lot of love, her teacher, Sister Angélique-Marie, guided Ludivine's regular schooling, from the first year of study to the sixth grade with an exam photo at the end of each year.

Her spiritual formation led her to her first communion and confirmation. But in her early twenties, after the announcement of her imminent death, she resisted the idea of leaving this world. As a result, her preparation for death became a necessity for her teacher and the chaplain.

After a remarkable preparation, Ludivine passed away peacefully at the age of twenty-two on April 3, 1918. Her funeral was held at the Institute for Deaf and Mute Girls and she was



buried in Notre-Dame-des-Neiges Cemetery in Montreal.

About ten years ago, some of the Lachance family came on a pilgrimage to Notre-Dame-des-Neiges Cemetery and found no trace of Ludivine's grave. A member of the family reported this to Sister Madeleine Coutu who went for a walk in the Cemetery to the deaf-mute field to see this. She was told by a receptionist: "When small tombstones break, they are thrown away after a few years. You can have a new monument made".

And so, on June 17, 2022, we attended the inauguration of the second monument in her memory. We wanted it

to be small, of the same size, and with the same inscription as the original. This monument was made possible thanks to the generosity of Ludivine's friends, the Sisters of Providence and the Sisters of Our Lady of Seven Dolors, all at the initiative of Madeleine Coutu, SP

Nota bene: Ludivine is probably the only one of our former students having a biography, with three editions: the 1st in 1927, the 2nd in 1928, and the 3rd on the centenary of her death on April 3, 2018. For the 2nd edition, its author, Corinne Rocheleau, received the Vermeil Medal of the Prix de la langue française awarded by the French Academy.
