Journey to Oneness - Reflection on community life

The strength and vitality of our Congregation depend on the degree to which the local community lives the Gospel values, thereby proclaiming and manifesting the Providence of God and the compassion of our Mother of Sorrows. (C85).

Let me begin this reflection on community life by evoking the figure of Jesus Christ, the center of our life and our vocation,

During his life, Jesus carried out what He recognized as the Will of God, and which, in fact, grew into an invitation and motivation for the society of his time to trace an alternative way of life. For Jesus, suffering the oppression of the

political and religious leaders of his time, was the motive for his compassion and was the reason for his anger. This oppression was in no way a true reflection of God's creation or of his Glory, which materializes in fulfilled, happy and well-accomplished human beings. Thanks to his great love for humanity, Jesus was able to look beyond principles that had been established for centuries and to critically question the social structures that were

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no longer suitable and that even dehumanized men and women alike.

In his quest for social transformation, Jesus invited those who shared his enthusiasm to join him in his innovative, liberating, motivating, dignifying, and renewing proposals. His circle of supporters and followers adhered to his vision. In following him, they were particularly driven by their own curiosity and their desire to live as He did. With his spirituality centered on the simple fact of being the Son of God, Jesus revealed and showed himself with authenticity and authority. He knew that his mission was grounded in his intimate relationship with his Father and that this relationship was and is the source of his strong desire to "be ONE" with him.



Our community is on its way to a new form of organization; we long to be "ONE" and, although unity is part of who we are, there is something we feel even more passionate about: "So that they may all be ONE, as you, Father, are in me and I in you". We feel passionate about it because

we want the proclamation of Providence to extend beyond our lifetime and to give new meaning to the society of our time. This leads us to a different understanding of BEING TOGETHER, of bonding and building community, that helps us to fulfill our Mission. A mission which calls each of us to "discover Jesus Christ, especially in those who are suffering; to serve him through works of mercy, and to be a sign of hope and resurrection in today's world" (C8).

"Community life is organized for the sake of the Mission..." (C48)

Community life is the way in which we, the Sisters of Providence, have chosen to live our lives. We consecrate ourselves to God in the service of the Mission that Jesus entrusts to us as part of the Church. Today, our community reality is being transformed by the demographic changes the Congregation has been going through, and for that reason we have undertaken this journey towards becoming a single canonical entity. This is the challenge we are facing in this historical moment. Moving into our new structure does not mean a mere formal change. Following its own new dynamics, we are being called to "transform" our individual and congregational surroundings, hoping that our lives will bring meaning and light to the society of which we are a part.

Although for many years, the current governance structure has helped us to meet the demands of the society in which we live our vocation, we are now aware that urgent change is upon us. And this change/transformation is not merely "making adjustments", or just a new way of organizing ourselves. The "Charity of Christ" is urging us to make our way through a transformation of life. She is inviting us to review our personal lives and the relationships we have among ourselves and with others. She is inviting us to review our attachments, our flaws, our faults, and our personal needs that point to our need for healing. The times in which we are living bring us a new opportunity for our personal and community life which we, in turn, can offer to society as new ways of relating to each other, new ways of interacting that elevate the humanity in us, and that mirror the "Glory of God", which requires humans to live a full life.

Most of us yearn for transformation and expect that the "new structure" and the new ways of organizing ourselves will sort out our community needs. For my part, I believe that this transformation is leading us to new ways of life, new ways of relating to each other.

The transformation of our own society, as Sisters of Providence, depends on each one of us and takes into consideration

each one's reality, capability, and capacity. Each one has something to offer. It will be your contribution to the new structure, so that it continues to work for us and makes sense for our Mission.

Allow me to share with you some personal questions that may be helpful for your own reflection:

What am I willing to change so that the community meets its *raison d'être*? Am I willing to take the challenge of reviewing my life, my attitudes, my ways of relating and acting; am I giving myself the opportunity for transformation and to be a part of the new congregational structure? In what ways do I need healing, reconciliation; am I taking care of myself, so that my presence in the community enhances our common Mission?

May this Easter Season help us to remain attentive to the presence of the Risen Jesus, who invites us to a new life in freedom, compassion, and boldness.

Journey to Oneness –

Some Sisters of Providence share with us their vision of a local community once the "unity" of the Congregation is in effect and some collaborators testify to their commitment to the SP Mission.

*I*n our Constitutions and Rules, it is written: "the local community is the basic unit of the Congregation." All the vitality of the Congregation is experienced within this basic unit. Local

communities need to carry life and make everyone feel welcomed and accepted exactly the way they are. In general, a local community brings together sisters living under the same roof, as stated in R87: "Sisters living at different addresses may be grouped together for the sake of the Mission to form one local community." In some places, sisters live in different

houses, and form one and the same local community. What is fundamental is the community spirit that is experienced through sharing and dialogue. The relationship among sisters facilitates community life. By being mindful of our reality as an international, intercultural and intergenerational Congregation, we become aware of the importance of interdependence for a thriving local community. It is even more important to consider the place of mutual relationships and good communication for a healthy local community.

Local communities may be formed by sisters from different places in the Congregation. It would be convenient for each local community to have a sister from at least two different nationalities and

from different age groups, either in a virtual or a face-to-face environment. Sisters will be united by the Charism and the mission. This type of community will facilitate and encourage more younger people to consecrate themselves to God in our institute. The local community will thus live our Mission according to the orientations of

the 2022 chapter, taking into account the context of the current world: the cry of the poor, the vocational ministry, the initial formation, and the reality of our elder sisters living in the various houses or in local communities adapted for their needs.

How do I collaborate in the mission of the Sisters of Providence?

Some concrete examples of my active involvement which occur in the infirmary at the Pavilion Providence are:

- Errands for the sisters including purchases for celebrations and events.
- Visiting the sisters in the infirmary to respond to their needs and to comfort them.
- Repair watches, hearing aids and other used objects, to avoid new expenses.
- Meet sisters' requests for the internal "general store".
- Manage the secondhand shop "Les Petits Plaisirs" (Small Pleasures) on the 2nd floor of the Pavilion, open to the Sisters of Providence and to sisters from other congregations, according to their needs.
- Organize the "Give it forward" event when staff of the Motherhouse and the Providence International Center can choose, for free and at liberty, objects from donations by residents of the Carrefour Providence. (The Providence Mother House)



We also collect money donations for pre-established causes. Currently, the donations collected are for the Haiti mission, for disadvantaged youngsters from the Émilie-Gamelin school in Torbeck, Haiti, allowing disadvantaged children to have access to education. The last amount sent was \$852.85.

It seems to me that by contributing to the well-being of our sick and elderly, I

continue the benevolent charity work of our Blessed Emilie Gamelin, which makes me feel proud. (See the film, "Les Discrètes").

Finally, I am grateful for the gift of life and the opportunity to carry on working in solidarity with the Sisters of Providence while making a humble contribution to the well-being of this happy living community!



A Capsule for our Common Home



The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development, for we know that things can change." (LS 13).

During this period of transition where we are experiencing transformation and hope, during our journey towards becoming a single canonical entity and while we let new life spring forth, let us remember that we are also called to promote unity from diversity and to live with love and compassion together with the rest of creation. And so, to bring new life to the activities related to JPIC, we can draw inspiration from the

Laudato Si Movement. Launched in 2015 after the publication of Pope Francis' encyclical "Laudato Si'", this movement responds to the cry of the earth and to the cry of the poor. Nurtured by the rich diversity present in creation and within the Church, the goal of the Movement is to care for our common home, a commitment that we, as Sisters of Providence, all share.

When your community lacks resources, housing, transportation, health care and other basic human needs, missionaries are sometimes the only source of assistance.

Sr. Vilma Franco, SP, runs a thriving ministry based in Arcatao, in the Department of Chalatenango, El Salvador, that exemplifies the last words of Mother

Joseph, "Whatever concerns the poor is always our affair."

Sr. Vilma does it all.

Her tasks include catechesis, leading communion services in the absence of priests, building houses, teaching children traditional dances, and maintaining connections with isolated people. And she also regularly transports residents three hours to doctor and hospital appointments in San Salvador. When the five-person cab is full, people ride in the truck bed. (A common occurrence in the Central American

Commemorations for the 170th Anniversary of the Sisters of Providence in Chile Will Extend to the Works in the Province and throughout the entire Year. Text and photos: Communication Office of the Province



Since December 2022, the Bernarda Morin Province in Chile has been planning ways to share with the rest of the Providence Family its joy for the commemoration of the 170th Anniversary of

the arrival to our land of Mother Victoria Larocque, as General Superior, Sr. Amable Dorion, Sr. Mary of the Sacred Heart Bérard, Sr. Dionisia Benjamin Worwoth and our dear Mother Bernarda Morin. To achieve this, a



committee has been formed to plan events for the year and to undertake different actions and initiatives that will motivate the various Providence Foundation Institutions across the country to carry out their own celebrations and to invite each one to join the Sisters of Providence in celebrating.

Some examples of the type of events (some of them have already been held) are the meetings of the Pastoral Ministers, the Providence Associates and the liaisons to the Office of the Cause for the Beatification of Mother Bernarda, which took place on March 24th. Also, the commemorative event in the *Teatro Oriente* in Sector Providencia, the Eucharistic Liturgy celebrating the 170th Anniversary in the Cathedral of Santiago, and a seminar on spirituality and the history of our Congregation and Province, among other activities.

The Committee is also encouraging the institutions of Bernarda Morin Province to carry out events of their own to celebrate these 170 years of the Congregation in Chile. Some of the initiatives being encouraged include the following: disseminating posters and banners and promoting cultural workshops and gatherings around the anniversary; the organization of *Table of the King* events and other social action initiatives, like visiting orphanages and nursing homes, as well as visiting our own province's homes for the elderly, and conducting fund-raising campaigns for the *Comedor Emilia Gamelin* (Emilie Gamelin Dining Room).

The Commemoration in Emblematic Sites of the Capital City and the Eucharistic Celebration in the Metropolitan Cathedral

The flagship commemorative event will take place at the *Teatro Oriente*, located in the district of Providencia, Santiago, where the Providence Family will gather on June 13. This venue for the celebration was chosen precisely in the district named after the Sisters of Providence.

The *Teatro Oriente*, originally inaugurated as *Teatro Olympto* on September 17, 1935, has an 855-person seating capacity, including seats in the upper gallery and in the parterre. Inside its walls, great musicians, singers, actors, and dancers from Chile and from the rest of the world, have been acclaimed by different audiences. In 2021, the *Teatro Oriente* was declared a national historical monument.

The Eucharistic celebration of the arrival of the Sisters of Providence in Chile will take place on June 17, at the Metropolitan Cathedral of Santiago, situated on the *Plaza de Armas* of the capital city.

Being able to celebrate the Eucharist precisely on June 17, the date of the arrival in Chile of the five missionaries of the Congregation, and having Cardinal Celestino Aós, Archbishop of Santiago, Chile, as the presider for the Mass, can only be considered as a double blessing.

In the months to come, the *Comedor* will be open during its usual hours, three days a week, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

We would like to thank our volunteers and to ask the Sisters of our Congregation to join us in prayer for this work of Providence and for those who benefit from it.

*A*fter its usual summer break, Comedor Emilia Gamelin (The Emilie Gamelin Dining Room) is now open and serving free meals and giving clothing to those in need.

The re-opening took place on March 13, 2023. After welcoming all the participants, Juanita Tapia, a Providence Associate, and the coordinator of the *Comedor*, together with other volunteers, served the meal they had prepared earlier that morning for the diners.
